# 





Operations in Viet Nam and aboard carriers while maintaining a third echelon at Iwakuni stretched our personnel resources certainly beyond concept and almost beyond belief. Again, as an all previous occasions, when the demand for performance and output was apparent, you Marines more than delivered. Not just for a three day ORI or a ten day field exercise, but for a solid, demanding six months. Repeatedly entire departments extended themselves days on end to achieve whatever the situation has required. With-honest humility I confess that I don't really know what your limit is, what VMCJ-1 cannot do.

All of us commenced this tour as products of the Marine Corps system. We end it with heads held high, aware that we have kept faith with its traditions and contributed in our small way to its annals. I know from observation that each of you men leave VM.CJ-1, after two years of hard work and satisfying accomplishments together, as better Marines. I earnestly hope that your associations and experiences in this squadron has left each of you a better man.

I very sincerely thank each and every one of you for a splendid effort and may God Bless you all.





### A Message from the C.O

I am sure that two years ago when we formed as VMCJ-3 at E1 Toro none among us realized how gruelling that first year would be, dared predict how solidly we would jell in Japan, nor could envision how splendidly we would represent the Marine Corps in Viet Nam and aboard carriers in the Seventh Fleet.

At El Toro, commencing on a shoe string, we accepted a commitment while taking muster and after that it seemed that crises came in pairs and we were perpetually chasing trains. It was hectic and full of new experiences but the ground work laid there was solid, as events were soon to prove.

Three highlights in that first year stand out in my mind. Operation "Blindman" where both VMCJ-3 and IstLAAMS Battalion garnered a wealth of knowledge; the Cherry Point deployment which served as a sharp catalyst to our Electronic Warfare program; and I shall never forget the pride I felt on the Midway when we achieved a 75 percent boarding rate on a very black IFR night.

In Japan, we promptly established the personality of this VMCJ-1 as a squadron of professionals. The performances of you as individual Marines on the parade field, at your jobs and on liberty has been the underlying source of our pride in each other and with each other. From this you men fashioned the real spirit of this Squadron, a driving determination to do the job, which has carried us so far.

#### THE MISSION OF VMCJ

TO CONDUCT AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHIC RECONNAISSANCE, AIRBORNE ELECTRONIC RECONNAISSANCE, AIRBORNE ELECTRONIC AND COMMUNICATIONS COUNTERMEASURES IN SUPPORT OF FLEET MARINE FORCE OPERATIONS.

### HISTORY OF VMCJ-1 1964 - 1965

On the 2nd of November, 1963 at the VMCJ-3 flight line, EI Toro, California, Lieutenant Colonel Otis W. Corman, USMC assumed command of VMCJ-3 from which the 1964 - 1965 Cadre was to be formed to replace VMCJ-1 in Japan.

During the ensuing months, this cadre became a highly trained, interegrated group capable of day and night operations ashore or afloat, as a completely deployed squadron or as many small detachments spread throughout any given geographic area.

This training necessitated operating from MCAS, CHERRY POINT, N.C. LITCHFIELD PARK, and MCAS, YUMA, ARIZONA; EL CENTRO, CALIFORNIA and from the aircraft carriers, USS CORAL SEA AND MIDWAY in addition to the home base of MCAS, EL TORO, CALIFORNIA.

The culmination of these efforts resulted in another similar ocasion to that which started the

year...... a change of command ceremony at the VMCJ-3 flight line on 24 October, 1964 when LtCoI. CORMAN handed command of VMCJ-3 to the new Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel F. C. OPEKA.

The climax of a year's training came on the morning of November 3rd, 1964 when the Colonel and men left MCAS, El Toro for Iwakuni, Japan as the 1964 - 1965 Cadre.

The following pages are a pictorial record of this unit and it's tour in the Far East and Southeast Asia where the men wrote a new page of Marine Corps history at Da Nang Airbase, Viet Nam.





The responsibility for leading VMCJ-1 in the accomplishment of it's mission of aerial photographic and electronic reconnaissance came into the able hands of LtCol O. W. CORMAN, U. S. Marine Corps in November 1964. In addition to his unusually capable leadership qualities the new "Skipper" brought with him a wealth of aviation experience accumulated during his 22 years as a Naval Aviator. Under his leadership this squadron has established throughout the Pacific Command a reputation for outstanding performance.

"Cotton Picker Six" answered his first muster in Rushville, Illinois in 1923. His higher education includes studies at Knox College and North Western University prior to being awarded a degree in Political Science by George Washington University. Formal military schooling, beyond his training as a Naval Aviator in 1943, has included the presently named Amphibious Warfare School and the Command and Staff College at Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Virginia.



After completing Torpedo Bomber operational training at NAS Jack-sonville, Florida in 1943 he received his first taste of combat in the South Pacific at Bouganville and Rabaul as a member of VMTB-233. A transfer to VMTB-134 later brought him into action at Peleliu.

The early phase of the Korean Conflict found the "Skipper" then a Captain flying F4U-5N Corsairs on the Naktong perimeter as a member of VMF(N)-513. During the epic Chosin Reservoir engagement his squadron displaced from Wonsan to YonPo, near Hamhung, Korea and was totally occupied in providing both day and night close air support for the 1s Marine Division. There were now very few areas of Marine Aviation in which he did not possess a working knowledge.

Immediately upon his return to CONUS he assisted in reforming VMF(N)-542 which was equipped with the first of the Marine Corp's F3D Skynight aircraft. In 1952 he was assigned to a tour as a night fighter exchange pilot with the British Royal Navy. Joining Night Fighter Squadron 809 he participated in Mediterranean and North Sea cruises aboard HMS EAGLE, a Battle of Britain Air Exercise, and, NATO Operation "Mainbrace."

Now a Major, he returned CONUS in 1953 and spent a short tour in VMF(N)-214 before returning to Korea and rejoining VMF(N)-513.

In the years that followed, in addition to Commanding HQSQ-17, VMFT(AW)-20 and VMCJ-3, he has filled many varied staff billets such as assistant air officer of the First Marine Division, Air Wing Embarkation Officer, "O" Club officer, Air Station Personnel Officer, and Section head at Division of Aviation, Headquarters Marine Corps.

Among his many ribbons you will find the Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with four gold stars, as well as the Navy, Army and Korean Presidential Unit Citations which reflect on his distinguished career.

Now that he has been selected for promotion to Colonel we have had the pleasure of being in his "last" tactical Squadron and we wish him God-Speed. We have all had the pleasure of serving with one of the finest.



Second in command, Major Paul A. MANNING was born in San Diego, California in 1930. Enlisting in the Navy in in July, 1947 the Major qualified for the NAVCAD program and was commissioned as a Naval Aviator in the Marine Corps in 1950.

During Korea he served with VMF 312 aboard the carriers BAIROKO and BATAAN. Forthis he received the D F C and two Air Medals.

Returning to the States the Major took part in a Med Cruise with VMF(N) 114 aboard the TARAWA. Following this was a tour as instructor at the Naval Advanced Training Command at Cabaniss field, Texas. Then to VMR 352 at E1 Toro and VMA 212 at Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii.

After attending Junior School at Quantico during 1961 - 1962 he reported to Camp Pendleton as Air Laison Officer, 1st Marines, 1st Marine Division in time to take part in the Cuban Crisis of October, 1962

Joining VMCJ-3 in August, 1963, the Major became

Executive Officer of this Cadre. Devoting most of his effort to "Yankee Team" aboard the HANCOCK and CORAT SEA he earned three Air Medals, the Navy Commendation Medal and the Purple Heart. The latter was received as a result of injuries sustained after being shot down on his last combat mission.

The Major now calls Perth Amboy, New Jersey his home were his wife Joyce and his daughter Laurie Jo await his return.

We wish him the best in his next duty assignment at Quantico.

Our First Sergeant, Frank A. CIROU, enlisted in the Marine Corps from St. Petersburg, Florida in 1941. After Boot training at Parris Island, S. C., he saw action with the 6th Regiment, 2nd Marine Division at Tarawa, Saipan, Tinian and Okanawa. After the armistice he served with the occupation forces in Japan. During the Korean conflict he served with MAG 12, 1st Marine Air Wing.
